#### **INTRODUCTION**

The 4<sup>th</sup> quarter was characterized by splash floods which caused disaster in Sololo district during the months of November and early December. CIPAD through OVC Sololo project supported the flood displaced people targeting the beneficiaries of Sololo project. The floods halted ongoing project like finishing of basement construction plastic tanks for schools as roads were impassable due to erosions and mud

Obbitu children village was not seriously affected by floods since environment was conserved and with adequate vegetation cover.

#### OVC NOT COOPERATIVE DURING HEALTH ASSESSMENT AND HOME VISIT

The tabulated list of OVC have difficult to access and collect their information. Some are grown ups, others dropped out of school, while others have left sololo. Some deliberately refuse to cooperate with the field officer and health assessment team. Most of them are in adolescence age and feel big adults to participate in health assessment.

The OVC management committee discussed the list and strongly supported them to be dropped out of the program, And replaced with other needy OVC.

#### **HEALTH CARE OBBITU CHILDREN**

Generally the children have been healthy, common complain included ring worms, stomach ache and URTI. The cases mostly handled at Obbitu village with a first Aid kit.

Circumcision was done for 6 boys at Sololo hospital. 1 case developed complication and was admitted to Sololo hospital for 2 days

**EDUCATION** Obbitu children had impressive performance. Though some did poorly and were retained in the previous class. Obbitu children had text book ratio of 1:2. They had continuous supply of exercise books, Pens, erasers pencils and

## **LIGHTING:**

The solar charger, inverter on father's house is fault. Some bulbs at children house is also blown off and requires replacement. We changed the regulator of the big generator and a new battery

## **STAFFS AT OBBITU VILLAGE**

The mother caretakers and house helper are core in welfare of children they are fine and well motivated. During the months of November and December MR. Abdi wario was hired to on job training while Tume was preparing for her leave.

Mr. Gufu Guyo Reported full time at CIPAD and started to supervise the routine OVC activities Sololo project

#### **OBBITU MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE**

The meeting for committee was schedule for December, but due to floods was not done in December.

## **HBC FOOD DISTRIBUTION**

Food and non food items distributed for families of home based support were as follows

There was no maize and beans in the market due to floods. Foods were distributed twice per month. personal hygiene with soap was stressed and more soap distributed to improve cleanliness at household level.

#### **WATER TRUCKING**

Water distribution to schools and community members .beneficiaries of Sololo project received 20 litre jerken of water from Obbitu children village. 4 schools benefitted. The construction of basement was not completed due to floods, impassable roads and closure of schools over December holidays which made mobilization of c community

contribution a challenge. It was successfully completed in January except for Hamballo which the road was cut off due to a deep valley as result of heavy floods.

#### **FUND RAISING**

AMREF Maanisha program approved OVC secondary schools fees of KSHs 75,000 and 4 dairy goats for Obbitu children

Obbitu children village have started a poultry project with 11 chicken as a free range. A semi free Poultry house will be considered in near future

#### **CHALLENGES**

- 1. Floods and impassable roads to OVC centres and school to complete basement for tanks
- 2. The Solar electricity was faulty hence did not supplement power supply during the day and evening after 9.00PM
- 3. Some OVC have grown into adolescence stage. They have a unique behaviour which requires counseling. Maybe stigmatize the program for their social status. Or HIV stigma

#### **CONCLUSION**

Despite the drought and the floods, most activities were completed as planned. December was busy one due to update information of OVCs

CIPAD constitution was revised line with the requirement for Ngo registration.
